We also know that we will have to rise to challenges every day with ingenuity, compassion, resilience, fortitude, and integrity. 


DISBURSEMENT CHART 2020

Dr. J. Earl Gardner Fund

Provides free or subsidised medical treatment to needy patients suffering from chronic illness in areas of tumour, cleft palate repair, major limb amputation, scoliosis, stroke etc.

Patient Heart Fund

Provides free or subsidised medical treatment to needy patients suffering from heart ailments.

Cancer Fund

Provide free or subsidised medical treatment to needy cancer patients to undergo cancer related treatment.

Welfare Fund

Income received by Hospital during Sabbath (sunset Friday to sunset Sunday) are channelled towards this fund which provides free or subsidised medical treatment to assists needy patients in dialysis, cataract surgery, admission bills and minor surgeries.

General Fund

Provides financial aid to support the development and expansion of the Hospital, upgrading of the facilities, training of staff and sponsorship of nursina students.

The hospital's Medical Welfare Services Unit was established in 1997 to help the poor and needy with financial assistance


The Medical Welfare Services team assists patients and/or patients' relatives in seeking the appropriate healthcare treatment in PAH. The Medical Welfare Officer also liaises with doctors, nurses, other health professionals, as well as community resources and welfare agents in providing solutions for patients who are unable to meet medical costs. The Medical Welfare Services unit is a caring and responsive team that serves the local community who are in need of medical assistance by offering medical financial aid.

As responsible stewards of the charity funds, the team ensures that there is accountability and visibility for each case that is presented to the relevant committee for fund disbursement.







A TOUCH OF HOPE

For ever new parent, the day they finally get to hold their first born in their arms is filled with much anticipation. Baby Chong Jian, who lit up his parents' lives, was no different. It common, among breast fed babies, for rashes to develop rashes on their faces, therefore Baby Chong Jian's parents did not worry incessantly. However, as the rashes persisted for a week, and Baby Chong Jian developed difficulty breathing, his parents rushed him to our ER.

Chong Jian was swiftly admitted into the NICU and administered antibiotics, with the hospital bill taking only a handful of days to swell up beyond belief. As new and young parents, they were heartbroken seeing their precious bundle of life more tube than a child, living of

oxygen support, struggling to stay alive. They had never felt so terrified. They were very appreciative of the encouragement and support from doctors and nurses in our NICU, as they were trying to stay strong for their baby.

As new parents with minimal savings, they were ultimately worried for the inevitability of the hospital bill. Our nurse in-charge briefed the parents on availability of medical charity to assist Baby Chong Jian's medical expenses, and a total of RM18,700 was disbursed to cover his bill.

In March, Baby Chong Jian celebrated his 1st birthday. His smile radiates delight and he is the apple of his parents' eyes. We pray that Baby Chong Jian will continue to grow up healthy and be the joy of his family.



15 years ago, Madam Lee had undergone posterior spinal fusion but in 2017 she started to develop pain in her back again. Despite the pain, she had to care for her husband, who was unable to walk due to a major accident. Both Madam Lee and her husband rely on their children for household expenses and daily groceries.

As the pain continued, she tried all sorts of treatment, including acupuncture and physiotherapy, but her condition did not improve enough for her to even be able to walk. Despite the pain she was facing, she did not want to see any doctor as she knew her family's financial situation would not able to support the treatment cost.

When she could not stand the pain any longer, Madam Lee was rushed to the ER of Penang Adventist Hospital where the results of her MRI showed that there was a restriction of blood flow in the L3 and L4 of her spine (which plays an important role in supporting the weight of the torso and protecting nerves that descend from the spinal cord). She had to undergo two surgeries which consisted off an Oblique Lumber Interbody Fusion, a posterior spinal fusion with 8 screws inserted and a bone graft in order to stabilize her spinal structure.

The total cost of the surgery had come up to almost RM 30,000 and Madam Lee's children were not able to pay as they had spent most of the money on her first surgery. With the help from charity assistance, Madam Lee was granted a total of RM 20,000 for her surgery.

Now, after months of physiotherapy. Madam Lee is has recovered well and is truly grateful that she is able to walk straight without having to press her back when it hurts. She had a rough journey but her resilience put her back on track. With her head held high and a smile on her face, she has bounced back to her daily routines of caring for her family. The family decided to give back to the community by making a small contribution every month as a sign of reciprocation for the help they had been given from the charity fund.







Mr. Ng had been rushed to our ER due to a bloated stomach and difficulty breathing. These symptoms had persisted for the whole week but he had brushed them aside, thinking they are common among a diabetic survivor or tiredness due to long hours of work. An angiogram confirmed the blockage of three arteries between 80% to 100%.

Open heart surgery was unavoidable. Although Mr Ng had insurance, it was not sufficient to cover the estimated RM80,000 of the operation. Thinking of his children, who were only making enough to support themselves, Mr. Ng gave up hope and left his life to the hands of fate. Mr. Ng's children were deeply saddened by their father's decision. They wished to appeal to the public for funding through newspapers, but worried that their father would not be happy with such an approach.

It was their insurance agent who highlighted to the family that PAH had a fund for needy heart patients. That brought much hope back to the family. Mr. Ng's case was tabled to the charity committee and was granted approval of RM25,000 from our Patient Heart Fund.

Without any delay, Mr. Ng was scheduled for surgery, and we were ecstatic that his surgery was a success. 6 months after his surgery, Mr. Ng has resumed work, full of vigor.

Mr. Ng's daughter, who quit her job to care for her father full time, is deeply grateful for the medical charity granted by our Patient Heart Fund. Seeing her dad recover, day by day, getting back to making a living for the family, she looks forward to wonderful times that they will be able to spend together.

A NEW BEGINNING



Mr. Vidyakumara is a devoted father of 4 young children between the ages of 4 to 14, and is the sole breadwinner of his family. 2017, he was diagnosed with 1 artery blockage, and, unfortunately, the angioplasty that was scheduled at a government hospital did not proceed successfully. Mr. Vidyakumara was prescribed medication to control his condition.

For the next 3 years, Mr. Vidyakumara occasionally experienced breathing difficulty during work and was often sent to the nearest government hospital for treatment. Each time laying at the hospital bed, Mr Vidyakumara always wondered if he will be strong enough to recover and step out of hospital. His thoughts have always been of his 4 young children and his wife who will struggle to provide for them alone.

Day by day, Mr. Vidyakumara struggled through, trying his best to provide for his family. Unfortunately, in June 2020, he fell victim to sudden heart pain. He was rushed to the government hospital, where he was then diagnosed of the blockage of three arteries, ranging from 80% to 99%. Although his condition stabilized after medication, angioplasty was the only way forward. The waiting list was not on his side, however, and he would have queue for 7 months; until January 2021.

After the incident, Mr. Vidyakumara was not medically fit for work, so he had to stop and that meant no income to support his wife and four young children. He had no choice but to borrow from his employer to cover the family's living expenses.

A neighbor came to know of their condition and suggested PAH's availability of medical fund. Mr. Vidyakumara knew that he had to enquire and apply for medical assistance immediately. Within the next few days, Mr. Vidyakumara was granted RM50,000 medical charity assistance and the angioplasty was underway.

Today, Mr. Vidyakumara has resumed work, where he radiates good health and his home is filled with much laughter again. Mr. Vidyakumara knows very well that he has been granted second chance at life. He said "PAH not only saved me, the hospital also saved my whole family". He knows that saying thank you will never be enough, therefore he has decided that he will donate what he can on a monthly basis, paying forward so that many others will have the opportunity to experience what he did.


COURAGEOUS

M dm Ng was first diagnosed with Stage 2 Breast Cancer in 1994, when she was just 34. She was in shock when she received her diagnosis, and refused to accept it as she thought this situation was something she would never experience. As treatments drained her energy and the side effects began taking a toll on her, she unfortunately had to stop working. Married with no children, her husband has been her undying pillar of moral support since she was first diagnosed.

Unfortunately, throughout the course of 26 years, her cancer had metastasized to her lungs, liver, lymph nodes and bones. She seeked out various hospitals for treatments and had already spent their lives savings in attempts to get rid of the cancer. In 2017, a cancerous tumor was found in her brain, but at the time it was too small to be operated on. Constant monitoring was required, and unfortunately, over the years, it grew to the point where surgery was necessity. The surgery was a challenging one, but she came out victorious

RM 25,700 had been approved for Mdm. Ng's surgery to ease her financial burden. She continues to go for treatments, such as radiotherapy and oral chemotherapy in our Oncology Centre, and despite everything that Mdm. Ng has been through, she remains optimistic and hopeful that she will get better. She is a fighter; someone who does not give up easily and will continue to strive to live. Her advice for those fighting against cancer is to have a strong mind, so that you would be able to positively deal with cancer, to eat healthily and exercise for the betterment of your body.



OUR MISSION CONTINUES DESPITE THE PANDEMIC

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Tinagaran's world came to a standstill when he was told of his diagnosis of Stage 4 Ewing Sarcoma, a type of bone or soft tissue cancer. What seemed to be muscle pain at his right thigh after a football match turned out to be Stage 4 Ewing Sarcoma. Tinagaran recalled the ordeal when he was delivered the news. His first thought, as a young and rising professional footballer, playing with PJ City, was if he would ever be able to play football again? Football to him is not just a hobby, but a way of life; the only source of income for his young family.

Tinagaran was told of the long fight ahead. His treatment plan consisted of 6 cycles of chemotherapy, surgery, ** times of radiotherapy and followed by chemotherapy. In the midst of him struggling to source the finances for his treatment, he always had his family as the priority. He knew very well that he would have to fight this fight and come out victorious in order to be able to provide for his family. His family has continued to be his biggest motivator in facing the cancer treatment.

PAH through our cancer fund had disbursed RM50,000 to assist Tinagaran for his chemotherapy treatment while many other organizations had also came forward in full support, donating towards his cancer treatment.

Today, a year after his diagnosis, Tinagaran is undergoing chemotherapy after his surgery and he is responding well to his treatment. He has come to accept the fact that he will never play professional football again, and the one thing in his mind now, is to get well and get back to his family as a healthy man.

STRIVE FOR TOMORROW



The life of dialysis patient is never easy, with the lifelong treatment takes up majority of one's time and energy. Mr. Zahry who was diagnosed with End Stage Renal Failure in 2017 has been receiving his dialysis treatment at Penang Adventist Hospital for the past 3 years. His wife, the sole breadwinner of the family who works at her brother-in-law's small eatery, found dialysis treatments three times a week difficult to support. Being an amputee, his daily routines have to be supported by his wife, who also has to look after their 14-year-old son who is a high school student.

Although life has been hard on them, Mr. Zahry and his family did not give up on his dialysis treatments. Yes, at times he would feel discouraged as he is unable to help around the house as much as he wants to, but he continues to be thankful for the support of his wife and son, which are his motivating factors. Wanting to look for further financial help, Mr. Zahry was referred to our medical welfare services to inquire about financial assistance for his dialysis treatment.

After going through the necessary application process, and with the help of the Welfare Fund, Mr. Zahry has been able to continue his dialysis treatment with an annual disbursement that helps ease the burden of medical cost. We pray that Mr. Zahry and his family will remain strong through their hardships.



Our society, there are many who are in need of medical assistance. Mdm Wong had been diagnosed with acute diabetes 13 years ago, and as her glycemic index continuously increased, three years ago she began to inject insulin daily. At the beginning of the year, she had to triple her daily dose.

Unfortunately, Mdm Wong was diagnosed with cataract two years ago as a result of her acute diabetic condition. Her vision in her right eye was lost completely, and she was left with shadow vision in her left. Because of this, she relied on her hearing ability to distinguish between objects, but all too often she would knock against walls and furniture, causing multiple injuries. Due to that, she had to rely on her husband and her daughter to assist her around the house.

Mdm Wong had been to Penang General Hospital (GH) many times to seek treatment; unfortunately, due to her high blood sugar level at the time, cataract surgery was simply impossible. From the beginning of the year, GH had not provided her with any consultation dates, and Mdm Wong felt like she had lost all hope.

Feeling helpless, Mdm Wong had chanced upon YB Lim Siew Khim. YB Lim connected Mdm Wong to us and assisted her in applying for medical welfare assistance for cataract surgery on both her eyes. After a consultation with our Internal Medicine Specialist and Opthalmologist, Mdm Wong's case was presented and approved in less than two days.

A total amount of RM15,000 was approved from our Welfare Fund to assist Mdm Wong in both stabilising her blood sugar and her cataract surgeries.

In the week following her operations, our Welfare Officers could hear the joy and excitement in her voice when they had their follow up call with her. Her first comment to our welfare officer was "I can now see very clearly how handsome you are when we meet. My surroundings are beautiful." She poured out her sincere feelings to us and they warmed our hearts.

Since her surgery, Mdm Wong has bid a cheerful goodbye to her long and gloomy days. Gone are the days when she was constantly knocking into things because her vision was impaired. Her cataract surgeries siphoned normalcy back into her life; she is able to go to the market on her own volition, prepare meals for her family, and do chores independently.

After rain, there is a rainbow. Mdm Wong's husband has returned to work, and we believe there are many happier days to come for Mdm Wong and her family.


KUOK FOUNDATION

PAH is a not-for-profit hospital and is not required to return profits to shareholders like taxable organizations. We reinvest revenue in excess of expenses to enhance our capacity to deliver high quality healthcare to the community we serve. These resources provide for a long-term focus on charity care, the recruitment and retention of outstanding medical professionals, employee training programmes, new facilities and service. In addition, such resources also enable us to provide numerous other community health programmes that benefit the public.

In year 2020, PAH invested RM 31 million in Community Benefit Activities. From this amount, RM 5.01 million was allocated for the hospital's support services, community health education, health screenings, outreach activities and discounts to patients and corporate who met certain criteria.


